Regina Scott Memorial Scholarship

General information

The Regina I. Scott Memorial Scholarship is hosted by the HoChunk Renaissance program and fully funded by the Scott & Armendariz families. The HoChunk Renaissance program is the official language program of the Winnebago tribe of Nebraska.

The scholarship is awarded to (1) one-student attending an accredited school full time for both fall and spring semesters. The applicant must be seeking a bachelor's degree in any field at a (4) four year accredited college or university.

The student will be eligible to receive \$500.00 per semester and not exceeding \$1,000.00 per school year.

Guidelines for Eligibility:

- Must be enrolled in a federally recognized tribe
- Must maintain and possess a 3.0 GPA or higher
- Must be attending a (4)-year accredited college or university

Regina I. Scott

Biography

Regina I. (Greyhair) Scott was an enrolled member of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska. Regina was born on January 31st, 1941 in Black River Falls, Wisconsin. She attended and graduated from the Tomah high school. Eventually she enrolled into the Haskell Indian Nation University in Lawrence, Kansas and completed her bachelor's in business administration.

She moved to Oakland, California and began to work in traffic court. She met her husband Sandy McIntosh Scott and had two children- Johnny & Maria. Thereafter, they moved to Tulsa Oklahoma and had Sandy, Van and Cindy. They raised their five children and lived in Oklahoma for many years.

As years past and she found a career opportunity in Ashland, Wisconsin with the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Eventually, Regina decided to return to Winnebago, Nebraska to take care of her mother and work for the local community hospital. She also became involved with the community senior citizens program and the Jesus Our Savior Lutheran church.

Regina Scott's character consisted of being selfless, honor, integrity, cultural centered, and family oriented. Regina put herself last in any equation and helped others through their struggles and obstacles. She believed in hard work and working toward accomplishing goals. She was an advocate for education and would push her family and friends to pursue education. Family was another important pillar in her life.

Regina had many friends and loved all of her relatives. She expressed the importance of education and believed in her rich Winnebago heritage. She was also dedicated to helping preserve the language and culture. She played a vital role in the HoChunk Renaissance department to transcribe numerous audio recordings from the HoChunk language to the English language.

In late 2012 Regina was diagnosed with stomach cancer and passed away on February 5th, 2013. Today, a memorial scholarship is established in her honor.
